


Energy Insights



Natural Gas Utilities Continue to Grow



- The U.S. saw an addition of 640 thousand residential natural gas consumers between 2021 and 2022.
- This annual increase is the equivalent of 1,752 new gas customers being added each day in 2022.
- These additions reflect historical trends of around a 1 percent average annual increase since 2000.
- The growth in residential gas customers reflects consumer preference for natural gas for space heat, hot water, cooking, and drying. The average household has between two and three unique natural gas appliances.
- Based on each state's average household size, natural gas powers the lives of over 189 million residents in the U.S.
